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Guidance

Children and young people across the country have experienced unprecedented disruption to their education as a result of coronavirus (COVID-19). Those from the most vulnerable and disadvantaged backgrounds will be among those hardest hit.

The aggregate impact of lost time in education will be substantial, and the scale of our response must match the scale of the challenge. Schools' allocations will be calculated on a per pupil basis, providing each mainstream school with a total of £240 per pupil.

Use of Funds

Schools should use this funding for specific activities to support their pupils to catch up for lost teaching over the previous months, in line with the guidance on curriculum expectations for the next academic year.

Schools have the flexibility to spend their funding in the best way for their cohort and circumstances.

<p>Workforce and pupils resilience has been drastically reduced</p>	<p>Kisharon school remained open throughout the pandemic; staff continued to deliver a hybrid offer of remote and face-to-face teaching, which in reality meant double the work, resulting in exhausted staff members. Due to the diverse workforce and pupils cohort, we have staff from a range of countries, with their families living internationally. This has resulted in high levels of anxiety for our entire school family about their families across the world in Israel, Afghanistan and South Africa.
